Cynthia Nikitin has led numerous large-scale and complex projects during her nineteen years with Project for Public Spaces, as Vice President for Downtowns. With a portfolio of more than 175 projects, Cynthia's technical expertise stretches from the development of downtown master plans and transit facility and station area enhancement projects, to the creation of corridor-wide transportation and land use strategies for state highways, to the development of public art master plans for major cities, and the coalescing of civic buildings, like libraries into civic centers.
